WHAT GOES UP MAY COME DOWN - FASTER!

The 2003 - 2004 contest season is coming to a close and the cool weather has turned into spring. Before the hot humid summer weather gets here, it is time to start thinking about getting that new antenna up in the air or repairing one or more of the old ones. Find a tower and there is a good chance you will find an antenna project. If you listen to 146.66 you have probably heard some of us talking about the current and future tower and antenna projects. How much work it is, how much fun it is and, when the work is done, how well the new aluminum and copper perform.

I am sure that everyone is very aware that working "ON" towers can be very dangerous. The climbers always wear safety belts and are very cautious during the climb up, the actual time working on the tower and then again during the climb down. It is obvious to all of us that safety and caution are mandatory no matter what height you are working. What we may not realize is how dangerous being part of the ground crew can be. How many of us wear hard hats when part of the ground crew. I would bet less than 5%. Have you ever been helping on a tower crew when one of the climbers dropped something? I have dropped bolts, nuts, and an occasional tool. The ONLY tower project that I can remember wearing hard hats was at Keith Dutson's. Not only did we wear the hats, Keith had them there waiting for us when we got there. WAY TO GO KEITH! Please follow one simple rule this spring and all the time. NEVER stand at or near the base of the tower when something is going on up top even if you wear a hard hat.

Famous last words: "I don't have a tower so there is nothing to worry about in the way of tower or ground crew safety." How hard is it to simply get a line over your favorite tree branch?

Well, you don't need to be working on or around towers to be exposed to situations that might cause injuries. How did you get that line through the tree? Tie a box wrench on the end of a rope and throw it over? Use a sling shot with a fishing reel and sinker? Put that ladder against the tree limb? Last time I used a sling shot I ended up with a big gash in my thigh and blood dripping from my forehead. The sinker got snagged in the tree and after it broke free gravity took over and "BANG". Lucky it hit my forehead and not my glasses. The leg gash was due to me watching the sinker and not what was in the woods where I was working. I still don't know what I ran into, but the results were quite evident. If that happened with a sinker one can just imagine how much faster that box wrench would be moving and the increased "damage to weight" ratio it would have.

I don't think much time is needed to discuss ladders. Just think about branch strength, power lines and aluminum, the bottoms sliding out from under it, keep going!!

So, in closing, it is spring and one of the best times of the year here in Houston to get that antenna project done. Remember - whatever type of rig you have, it is no good without a good antenna. Whatever type of antenna you have, it is no good without a rig. And, most important, neither is any good without YOU.

Highlights of the meeting:

Programs - It was reported that the April program will feature a talk by George Diletto on repeaters. Adopt-a-Platoon Update

As usual, quite a lot has happened since the last update from the Ham and "Sheez" group! The most significant is that we have been accepted to sponsor a platoon in Iraq while they are deployed. The organization that we have been dealing with to become a sponsor is called Adopt-a-Platoon [http://www. adoptaplatoon.org]. The troop that we are sponsoring is the Army's 428th Military Police Company, 3rd platoon, stationed in Baghdad. There are twenty-eight soldiers in the platoon, and five are women. Currently, they are scheduled to be deployed until January 2005. Our sponsorship includes sending weekly letters and monthly care packages. As of the writing of this update, we have mailed three weekly letters and our first monthly care package -- Back to Basics. Thanks to the tremendous support of NARS members and friends, we shipped four boxes as part of the Back to Basics theme. Each of the twenty-eight soldiers will receive an individual bag filled with toiletry items (toothpaste, toothbrush, mouthwash, deodorant, soap, shampoo, lotion, razor, chapstick, handiwipes, mints, coffee, an individual Easter card, and two plastic Easter eggs filled with candies). The ladies also received a few items especially for them. You made all of this possible -- thank you for your tremendous support!

Your continued support in our efforts to sponsor the platoon in Iraq are requested and sincerely appreciated. Every month, we will have a different theme for the care package. A few weeks before the monthly NARS meeting, we will send a note letting everyone know the theme. If you would like to contribute any items toward the monthly care package, please bring the items to the NARS meeting. If you would prefer to make a donation toward defraying postage expenses, there will also be a coffee can for donations at each NARS meeting. But, the most important thing you can do is this -- help us with the weekly letter. You can do this by writing a note, asking your child/grandchild to draw a picture, taking a picture of your hamshack, writing a postcard, cutting out interesting newspaper or magazine articles, or bringing the comics from the paper. Then, bring the items you have for the weekly letter to the NARS meeting. Throughout the following month, we will put some of the items into each of the weekly letters. Communication is the most important gift we can give the soldiers. Through this communication, the members of the platoon will get to know us, and we will get to know them.

The care package theme for this month is "Spice Up Your Life". For those of you who have been in the military, you're very well aware that military food can be rather (horribly) bland. The idea of this care package is to help add a little flavor to the meals. If you would like to contribute to this

month's care package, please bring small condiment (ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, hot sauce, etc.) packages to the meeting. The size suggested is the type of packaging that you find at fast food places like McDonald's. Also, any types of spices in small plastic bottles would also be appreciated. Another suggestion for the care package is beef jerky or beef sticks. Please note: We cannot send any products that have pork due to strict religious regulations. All your contributions will be collected at the NARS meeting on Friday, April 16. We sincerely thank you in advance for your support!

Our first weekly letter was sent on March 10. It included a letter of introduction and some miscellaneous items that we thought the troops would enjoy. At this time, the U.S. Post Office is estimating that letters and packages take approximately three weeks to be delivered to Iraq. Assuming that time-frame is close to accurate, we are cautiously optimistic that we may receive a note back from the platoon in time for the April meeting. We will share all the letters we receive from the platoon at NARS meetings.

Your suggestions for items to send either in the weekly letter or in the monthly care package would be greatly appreciated. Please let us know your ideas, especially if you have served in the military,

Monthly recipe:

Ham in Cider (Fix-It and Forget-It Recipes for Entertaining)

3 lb ham (or larger; whatever fits into your slow cooker)

4 cups sweet cider or apple juice

1 cup brown sugar

2 tsp dry mustard

1 tsp ground cloves

2 cups white seedless raisins

Place ham and cider in slow cooker. Cover. Cook on low 8 to 10 hours. Remove ham from cider and place in baking pan. Make a paste of sugar, mustard, cloves, and a little hot cider. Brush over ham. Pour a cup of juice from slow cooker into baking pan. Stir in raisins. Bake at 375 for 30 minute until the paste has turned into a glaze. Serves 6 to 8.

OUA* Bill Denton W5SB?

Just about the time I think there couldn't possibly be another interesting person around I talk with another one of our NARS members. I get the feeling that the Earth must sag a little from the combined weight of knowledge in the Northwest corner of Houston on the third Friday of the month! And, I have barely even begun.

I finally hung up the phone yesterday evening after two hours on the phone with "Super Bill" W5SB, Bill Denton. By the way, he doesn't know who started that one, but he does like it better than a few of the other possibilities presented.

Bill started life in Knox City, in Northwest Texas. He had a scholarship at Hardin Simmons College in basketball and track. He wanted to be involved in agriculture and the role of county agent interested him, but he couldn't get the required classes at the College he was attending. He then made what he calls the best move of his life to Lubbock, where he met Marion at a poker game. NO, I didn't say he won her at the game - it was friendly. She was there with someone and so was he, but they noticed each other and were married in 1958. Their wedding was on a Saturday and on Monday he had a notice to appear for his physical a prelude to the draft. She was from Houston, so they decided to move there where she could attend the University of Houston. He had his paperwork transferred and they gave him three months due to the circumstances. During that time he decided to enlist instead of taking his chances at the draft. The enlisting officer asked if he had ever heard of Military Security. Bill replied, "No." and then asked what it meant. Neither one could figure it out, but they only had one opening, so Bill decided to take his chances. He was sent to Massachusetts for training then to a VERY remote post in northern Turkey. He was stationed there for a year with directional listening equipment tracking Soviet information. After that year he was sent to Ft. Bragg and attached to the 82nd Airborne, specifically working with Special Forces. He was just a few days short of time left to be transferred with several others on the base to the first group sent into Viet Nam.

After the military, and arriving back in Houston, he had decided that broadcasting interested him. He took several jobs to get to know people and find possibilities. When finally interviewing for a job with Channel 13 the interviewer asked him if he had a First Class Radio License and he said, "No, but I'm a Ham.", and he was hired on the spot! He said that every Ham he had hired had been a success.

This is where the really interesting part starts. Bill has so many stories about people he has met and places he has gone that I can only cover a few of the high points, but I'm sure he would love to tell more if you ask. I'll do my best to do it justice.

Bill spent the next six years on the NASA television crew. He was on the teams that interviewed the astronauts, kept watch over their homes, monitored lift-offs and was involved in nearly every major event.

The most memorable was the phone call in the middle of the night when there was a problem on Apollo 13. President Johnson was flying to town for a press conference and all the equipment had to be ready.

When the Huntley-Brinkley group came to town he was responsible for the equipment working properly. But his favorite responsibility was working with the foreign news teams. They would set up a camera and feed and then each reporter had a time slot. They would step in front of the camera and go live to China, Germany, France, England (the only one he could understand) then step off, exchange feed and the next one would step forward. The coordinator of this group was an Egyptian who spoke every language fluently. It was intriguing!

During this time Bill also worked for Channel 2, but finally ended up with a production company. Their main activity was commercials, but they also covered every Houston Rocket game, the first color game from the Astrodome and the first broadcast from the Summit. He also covered concerts, musical specials, pageants, special sporting events and elections.

Mohammad Ali's first fight from the Astrodome was televised and Bill was on the crew within a few feet of Howard Cosell.

Here are a few more highlights.

At the final show of the Grand Ol' Opry, in the original building in Nashville, everyone had left for lunch and he was the only one in the building. He heard a very deep voice say, "Hey, where did everybody go?" It was Johnny Cash, with wife, June and their son. They had arrived early before the crew had everything ready. He was very friendly and laughed about the place being empty.

After the show Bill was backing out of his parking place when centered in his mirror was the largest bosom he had ever seen. He had to turn and look, can you blame him? Of course, it was Dolly, just trotting behind his car. Can't you just see it!

His crew was in the Philippines covering the Miss Universe Contest while in the parking lot and in several places in the hotel bombs where exploding. They didn't like them being in their country! Lynn Redgrave was one of the judges and she was coming down an escalator when it caught her gown. He looked back and it was around her ankles! A designer, who was also a judge took her back to her room and made a marvelous dress out of a bed sheet. No one knew, until now!

He covered a Kennedy speech from Houston on November 21. He remembers looking up as the band played "Hail to the Chief". Kennedy strode in not five feet away. The next day he was assassinated in Dallas. It still is a sobering thought.

He covered both Johnson's election from Austin and his funeral at the ranch.

He was in Lake Tahoe for a concert when the crew was taking a break in the parking lot. A huge black Rolls Royce limo pulled up and before it even stopped the back door flew open and out jumped a tiny man. It was Sammy Davis, Jr. He walked up, shook hands and asked what was going on.

Ask him about your favorite - Patrick Swayze, Bob Newhart, Sonny and Cher, Kenny Rogers, Bob Crane, Ed McMahon, and probably others he has forgotten! Unbelievably he doesn't have any autographs. The crew always considered backstage the actor's private area and therefore gave them plenty of quiet space.

The events he didn't cover were a Super Bowl, World Series and the Olympic Games. He went to work for the production company the day after they covered the 1974 Super Bowl in Houston. He was scheduled for the 7th game of the World Series in San Francisco. The series ended with the sixth, and he was slotted for the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City, but the ABC union pulled rank and the affiliate stations didn't get to send crew.

Disappointments seem small in comparison with the things he was able to do. He burned out in 1981. He walked into his boss's office and said, "I've had enough."

He heard about a job with the Spring Branch School district and went from Class 5 rapids to Spring creek in the summertime! His days were now from 8 to 4 and he had weekends to his family. At first he wasn't sure he could handle the difference, but he did, for the next 21 years. When retired he stepped into another slower level, but still finds too many things to do!

Spring Branch had the largest television production facility in a school district in the United States. They set up some of the first broadcasts from one school to another. A teacher could teach a class in a different school. They could see her and she could also see them.

One of his final projects was to transmit live from the Globe Theater in London to a class in Houston. The class could ask the actors and directors questions and get immediate responses.

Bill and Marion have two daughters who have produced five grandchildren. One daughter lives in Houston and one in Connecticut.

They have five rescued cats. The oldest is 16 years and the newest has an interesting history. Marion's aunt was bedridden for several years and had a three-legged cat that always slept at the end of her bed. When they brought him home after her death the vet said the cat was totally blind. They allowed it to have its own area, but after a while it began exploring. He now sleeps on the window-sill, chases things thrown across the floor and probably thinks he is in kitty heaven.

When I asked my radio equipment question Bill responded that "it isn't important". He enjoys talking with people and learning who they are, where they live and usually never discusses equipment. His favorite band is 17 meters and I did catch that he has a 100 foot tower.

His most memorable contact was when he was in St Croix for the contest and a gentleman said he heard a southern accent and was home-sick. He was a missionary in Africa. He then said, "Have you heard of Tomball, Texas? That's where I'm from."

Another time he called a guy on the east coast who asked if he had heard of the NARS radio group in Houston, Texas. He said he was a past president! Bill replied that he was the current president!!! They talked every Sunday afternoon for several years.

Bill has several hobbies including reading; he is working his way through the Dale Brown fighter pilot series. He also loves photography and videography, which we have enjoyed the results of at our annual banquet.

Recently, Bill was in the qualifying rounds for the regional Golf Senior Olympics. He hasn't yet heard whether he made the cut, but we can ask at the next NARS meeting!

Several years ago, Bill and Marion both qualified for their pilot's licenses and in 1991, when Field Day was held at Friske Park, he gave rides over the site in his Cessna 172.

When I asked Bill how he would sum up his life he replied that he was "dependable". He goes above and beyond the call of duty. Bill, we're depending on you to always be a part of our group and keep adding color to our lives.
