Monthly Recipe

Ham and Cheese Stromboli from the Campbell's Kitchen

Thaw time: 30 min -- Prep time: 15 min -- Bake time: 25 min

Ingredients:

1/2 package Pepperidge Farm Frozen Puff Pastry Sheets (1 sheet)

1 egg

1 tablespoon water

1/2 lb sliced cooked deli ham

1/2 lb sliced cooked deli turkey

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Direction:

- 1. Thaw pastry sheet at room temperature 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 400. Mix egg and water.
- 2. Unfold pastry on lightly floured surface. Roll into 16 x 12 rectangle. With short side facing you, layer ham and turkey on bottom half of pastry to within 1" of edges. Sprinkle meat with cheese. Starting at short side, roll up like a jelly roll. Place seam—side down on baking sheet. Tuck ends under to seal. Brush with egg mixture.
- 3. Bake 25 minutes or until golden. Slice and serve warm. Serves 6.

QUA* Jim Kirk KJ5X?

We have a few - shall we say over-achievers in our group. But this is amazing. My latest interviewee was first licensed in 1992 and now has all but 10 (ten) of the DXCC countries confirmed! I was licensed in 2003 and have John, W5PDW and Tom. KD5EIJ confirmed, so there. Jim Kirk. retired needed KJ5X, and something to do with his spare time - he found it! Here's the rest of his

Jim was born in Okmulgee, OK. He gave me a history lesson (which I love!) and explained that it is the Nation Council House Museum. It is also one of the certified spots on the Trail of Tears, which is where four Indian nations converged. They Cherokee, were the Chickasaw, Choctaw, Muscogee (Creek), and Seminole. There is a good recap of this story at www.nationaltota.org/the-story. (A good reporter checks and re-checks her facts.)

Jim went to Okmulgee High School, which had the distinction of being started in one of the richest oil towns of the 1920's. They had one of the top ten schools in the country, with an aircraft mechanics class and a chemistry lab that rivaled the one at the university. For his birthday a few years ago his son found postcards of the school in 1920 and 1950 and gave them to Jim.

He then attended Oklahoma A&M, which became Oklahoma State University, receiving a degree in geology. He spent four years in the Naval ROTC, but was not accepted because of having flat feet. He did enlist in the Army as a Second Lieutenant and served at the Presidio in San Francisco, CA (cushy assignment!). From there he was with the Corp of Engineers as a topographical surveyor, at a site in eastern California, on the Nevada line. The only building for miles

was a Texaco station at a crossroad. Well, we know about crossroads in our lives – the person running the station was Judy; they struck up a conversation that has lasted for 47 years this past Valentine's Day. When he left the California site he went to Lafayette, LA and she took the Sunset Limited train to join him. Jim and Judy have two children, David, an A&M graduate and Mary Kay. Between them they have provided four grandchildren.

In Lafayette Jim interviewed for a job he found out about through his sister who worked for the Vice President of the company. In the interview he mentioned his two uncles, who were in the business. He was hired on the spot because of their integrity.

After eleven years the family moved to Tulsa where Jim accepted a position with Kewanee, the oldest independent oil company in the U.S. They lived there for ten years and then he was transferred to Oklahoma City.

As happens in our current corporate environment, Chevron bought his company and he was transferred to Houston in 1980. He retired in 1990

KJ5X was, as I stated earlier, licensed in 1992 as KB5SGW, but he had in interest in radio as a small boy and bought an SX100 shortwave, studied the Amateur Radio Handbook, but didn't know any Ham's and had no idea how to pursue his interest. After retirement he took a class down on 1960 and met Ken Harlan. He qualified for his Extra license in 1994.

Jim has an HF Kenwood TS950 SDX, a TS50 and a TS450. His antennas are a 15 meter loop in the

pine trees and an 80 meter dipole. He also has a Force 12 beam on Rohn 25 in his attic, which is a duplicate of George's [K5VUU].

But the amazing piece of this story is that he confirmed 278 countries on the wire! He is close to confirming his five-band DXCC.

His favorite contact came one evening shortly after he was licensed. It was the Maldives Islands with 100 watts using CW.

When I asked the question about other hobbies, such as reading, he said he loves science fiction. I couldn't help it, I had to ask the obvious question – what did he think about them using his name in Star Trek. He replied it wasn't that unusual, there were several Jim Kirks in Houston. The "Captain", first used by Uncle Zed, has stuck over the years. He has gotten used to it

He played football and basketball in High School and now loves golf, but is in need of lessons (his observation, not mine!).

His favorite pastime is archeology and he enjoys hunting fossils on Cypress Creek. He has three arrowheads registered with the state.

My question about how he would sum up his life was quickly answered with "I'm the luckiest guy in the world! I look back on how things happened, meeting Judy, beautiful children and grands, good job, good health – just how Blessed can a person be?" Well, Jim, we should all look at our lives based on our blessings as you do!
