This will truly be an exercise to set up portable and useful communications, not for any contest or score, but to give us all a chance to play at the real life side of portable operation.

DX News

"For All the NARS DX News Fit to Print"

October appears to have been an extremely slow month for the many NARS DXers as very, very few reports were submitted. Let's hope the cooler weather improves our participation on the bands.

John, W5PDW, was detracted as perhaps others by the activities at Hooks Fly In. He was able to get a one man guided tour of a B-17 by an ex-WWII B-17 pilot Bill, K5JHP. And you know John had his camera with him all the way. He must sleep with that camera!

John is ready for the winter radio season as he pulled some preventive maintenance on his TH-6 DX yagi tribander. That is well to do right now with this super autumn weather: not hot; not cold. Didn't know that kind of weather existed here in South Texas! "PDW" also received his "Route 66" certificate and a bunch of related QSL cards. Congrats John!

Bruce, N1LN (a.k.a. K5PTC) is doing the finals on his backyard Beverages for the season. In the cool months his backyard is about like mine: wires (Beverages) everywhere. He was able to pick up some new band counters this month:

CX5BW on 160m CW (#113) 9G5TF on 80/30 CW VR2XMT on 17m SSB

Bruce also reports a lot of much improved DX contact activity on all bands; not new-ones, but interesting areas:

V73RY on 10m SSB 6W7/F8PDR and EA6UN on 17m CW 5Z4DZ, XU7AYY, 5N5NDP, JT1CO on 20m

R1ANT on 30 and 40m CW 5X4/UA4WHX, VK5XE, 4X4BP and HB0/SP2FAX on 40m CW FO/N6JA and HA9RT on 75m SSB Worth looking into folks!

Bruce also hosted a NARS-member CQWW SSB all-band M/2 operation the weekend of 30/31 October. Rough recap:

1873 QSO's, 130 zones, 436 DXCC countries for 2,590,016 points. Interesting notes: First time DXCC on 40m from K5PTC with 101 countries. 55 DXCC countries on 75m. All of this in the low of the sunspot cycle! It was slow at times during the deep night; but during the sunset/sunrise and daytime, the bands were relatively hot! DX IS folks!

Cal, WF5W, has been in the house remodeling business recently taking him away from his radio. Got that house sold so now we expect to have some good DX reports from him. "Mr. Straight Key" also let us know that there are only two more sessions of SKN, held the second Tuesday of each month. Someone will be chosen as "Fist of the Year" from the participants. I think the yearly "Chosen–One" will be awarded a very nice traveling trophy. Cal also advises that the official Tomball ARC Field Day will take place on 12–13 November in Tomball.

I am assuming that Cal will be using his "K9AY" low-band receive antenna again this year. It seems to have worked pretty good for him last year. It's a small two loop-type of wire antenna for four switchable directions of the compass. The system provides a cardioid directional pattern in four different directions. Also includes a 15dB preamp and a bandpass filter covering the 160 and 80 meter bands. Others of you might be interested in this close spaced antenna for your low band receive antenna? I, also have one of these that I am experimenting (playing) with. This year I have the horizontal runs about six feet up (VS: 3-4 feet) to avoid OR-Deer interference.

Mike, K5UO: for myself, it has been a last minute maintenance opportunity with the "my kind of weather" putting the new Beverages up and replacing the Teledyne T12 LP original boom truss setup with an improved arrangement. Ms. Rita's visit sort of made that necessary. I don't mind running up and down the towers when it is 65–75

degrees F. So far there hasn't been any QR-Deer damage; but that will happen I am sure. There is a small herd of maybe ten deer that homestead every night in our side and backyard. They come in and go out along the fence lines where my Beverages are either terminated or fed; where they are the lowest to the ground. In years past I have put florescent ribbon, reflectors and tiny bells at the feed and terminate points with questionable results. I think deer may be like antelope and are nosy. Interesting new band-counters for this month:

ON4WW on 160m CW (#124) CX5BW on 160m CW (#125) First time ever heard Chile on 160m. HA9RT on 80m CW (#241) He was 599 here.

Important QSL's received: 9M6NA 17m CW. (20 day QSL turn-around from the JA operator!) KH9/W0CN on 12m, 15m, 17m (QSL turn-around was about the same!)

With the light member reports I will list some nice DX alerts from the bulletins:

- 1. Cyprus, 5B4: DL7AFS and DJ7ZG will be active until November 16. 160–6 meters all modes.
- 2. Tonga, A35: A35BO (HB9FBO) 80–10 m until November 18
- 3. Greece, SV: Special event station SX1W until October 30 celebrating 60th anniversary of the end of WWII. 80–10 meters.
- 4. Chagos Isl, VQ9: Larry, VQ9LA has been a regular all over the bands it seems. Also heard (not worked!!) VQ9X during CQWW SSB on 40m. Probably from the same station as VQ9LA.
- 5. Cambodia, XU: Two Belgium operators from IOTA AS-133, Koh Tas Isl from October 30 to November 10. XU is always a good one to catch!

- 6. Tunisia, 3V: 3V8A made a big play in the CQWW SSB test and was workable amongst the NA east coast and EU DX-ers. The ops will be there until October 31. Always a nice on to fetch.
- 7. Temotu Province, H40: Nendo Island, OC-100 in the Solomon Island group. A fairly big operation planned by the Korea DX Club from November 5-11. Six operators working all HF bands including 6m. They will have
- five Yagi beams and two verticals. They will use the call sign of H40HL. Before and after Nendo they will be on Solomon, OC-047 as H40HL, also.
- 8. Glorioso, TO4G: The long planned operation is still "on go" after the hurricane season for March 17 through April 7, 2006. The team is made up of French forces and transport by French tactical military. This always brings up the risk of last minute postponement or cancellation. There will be eight

operators, if possible and equipment for five stations. All bands, all modes.

My latest interviewee documents a wide variety of subjects. I hope to do a good job chronicling the life of N5BIA, Bill Buoy. Well, here it goes. . .

Bill is a true native Houstonian. For those who grew up in the area, He claims to have escaped from Helms elementary, then Hamilton Jr. High in the Heights and then Reagan High School.

He then attended three years of college each at a different one! Lee College, San Jacinto, Baytown and the University of Houston. He was working toward his EE degree, with an ulterior motive of avoiding the draft. But as happens to many, was distracted by marriage.

Then the draft notice arrived, anyway. Bill determined that there weren't many tanks in Viet Nam, so he should become a mechanic. His Basic was at Ft. Bliss, Texas and training at Ft Wachuca for training on wheeled vehicles and then Ft. Sill to learn track vehicles. Michael will be interested in this because he grew up in Lawton and lived there during the same time period!

Most of the classes went to Viet Nam, but Bill's entire class was sent to Germany. He served there for two years, one month and one day. He mused that it is interesting how those details stay with you for years.

The 20 Years of NARS

One of the things that really stand out to me in reading all the old NARS NEWS first published in August of 1985, is how rich the tradition the club is in two specific areas, public service events and for many years, Novice/Tech classes. Almost from the beginning founding fathers wanted to enhance our hobby by helping out in providing communications assistance to many public service events. Helping in these events honed their skills for when a disaster hit and good reliable communications was needed. In recent times events like hurricanes Katrina and Rita, these public service activities have provided a vital role. I read accounts that governmental communications during Katrina failed real early on and for a good period of time the only communications between some of these agencies where provided by Ham Radio operators. Some of those operators where from our club and the from the Houston area in general.

In the October 1985 edition of the NARS News, the first efforts of forming a study group type class was proposed to help members in upgrading their license. It would be a group of club members that would meet informally to help each other in theory and code. Higher licensees where encouraged to lend their helping hand as "Elmer's". Member David Taylor, WB5IPO, was among those wishing to form a study group and agreed to help organize the first such team. Heath/Zenith Mark Schaeffer of Electronics 5050 FM 19670 West, led an attempt to form a Novice class. In the February 1998 issue, the first Novice Licensing class was announced, it would be held at the Lincoln Institute, 7622 Louetta Rd. The March issue '86 announced that 36 people registered for the new class to begin on March 5th at the Lincoln Institute.

This Novice class tradition continued until just a few years ago, when it became more and more difficult to find students that wanted to sit though two weeks of theory and Morse code practice. With the reduction of Morse code and technical requirements, it was much easier to find all that information on the Internet. They could also get theory more quickly than before and they could receive their license in just a few days. In the April issue it was noted that that the FCC was

taking up 2 months to process the paper work and get the licenses out. We've had as many as 68 students in those annual classes. It's difficult to get a handle on just how many students went though those classes and how many of those got some level of license. Looking at the NARS roster, many of the Hams that are around now got their license in one of those classes and eventually many of them upgraded to Advance and Extra class. It was a sad day when NARS said goodbye to the traditional Novice/Tech class.

Another one of the NARS traditions is participating in public service events. In the November 1985 issue of the News, an article appeared entitled "Emergency Preparedness Plans Being Formulated by NARS." It mentioned that NARS has contacted local emergency preparedness officials and soon will begin inviting members to join ARES. Contact was made with Roger Schaper who has agreed to meet with NARS at a future meeting to explain the function of this group. In the October 1985 issue there is information on the Mexican earthquake and how NARS members made efforts in breaking pileups to pass health and welfare traffic on the behalf of Houston-area residents concerned about friends and relatives in the disaster zone. This is first mention that I could find of Public Service work by the club. Mike Pate, KA5LUD was announced as the new assistant emergency coordinator and liaison to ARES. He would help Dick N5DRM. NARS emergency coordinator.

The May '86 News asked volunteers to participate in the Kodak Liberty Bike Ride. It was a national fund raising event for the Statue of Liberty. In the years to come, **NARS** members would participate in many other events. Those would include many bike rides, Scouts Jamboree On Air (JOTA), Air shows like political Wings over Houston, conventions, marathons, walks to raise money for things like Muscular Dystrophy, Cancer research, Amateur Radio Serving Children (ARSC), hurricane disaster relief, Buffalo Bayou Regatta, Sierra Club Bike Hike, and the list goes on. In 1993 when I was president a lady came to one of our monthly meetings asking us to provide communication support for called SIRE organization (Self **Improvement** through Riding In the October 1993 Education). addition of the news reports the first event to be a success. The small group in attendance was Mike KD5WQJ, Vince KC0LM (SK), Waldo AB5FT, Brad WD5GNI and myself. It was reported that they raised \$2500.00 at the location near Cut and Shoot Texas. We covered this event from another location up until a couple years ago and I'm sure a lot more money was raised than the first time we did it.

In reading through the old news, another NARS tradition should be mentioned. The first VE session was held on March 26 1992 in conjunction with the Novice/Tech class. 39 elements were administered with 26 successfully passed by 23 candidates. On April 18th the first of the monthly VE session was started at the Tomball Community Center on Cherry St. Except for a short period of time the VE sessions have remained at the Community Center.

The traditions at NARS continued to grow. The membership is growing and I'm sure the operating skills of our members over the years have been greatly enhanced by participating in all the public service events, some in very uncomfortable and varying conditions and situations.

Another interesting fact the News reveal is, NARS held their first official meeting on August 23rd 1985 at the Cypress Creek Emergency Center, 16650 Sugar Pine. Because of growing membership a larger facility was needed. In February of 1994 the meeting place was moved to the Spring Cypress Presbyterian Church, 6000 Spring Cypress Road, and we continue to have the monthly meetings there.

I am still looking for some club pictures from the 1985–1992 era. If you have some let me know.

I hope everyone is planning on attending the banquet in January that will be dedicated to the 20th anniversary of NARS.
