September Meeting - Fire Prevention

This month is national fire prevention month. We have two presenters for this meeting and they bring a wealth of information on the subject of fire prevention.

First we have two members of the Harris County Fire Marshals Office. Mr. Marshall Kramer is Chief Fire Prevention Inspector. He has been in the fire service in varying position for the past 30 years. He holds a master Peace Office License from TCLEOSE and several other degrees.

Mr. Mike Montgomery Is Harris County Fire Marshal and Director of the Harris County Fire & Emergency Services Dept. Mike is Graduate of Texas A & M, Life time member of Cy–Fair VFD, deployed to NYC after 9–11.

Second Presenter is our own Paul Owen, who has been with Grinnell Fire Protection Company and its subsidiaries since 1993. Paul is a design engineer for commercial fire alarm and fire extinguishing systems of which his recent is the new Toyota Center. He will explain many of the current fire suppression systems being used today and stories about them. His company is donating two five–pound portable fire extinguishers to be given away as door prizes.

NARS Beginnings

In the spring of 1985 several hams in the Northwest area were concerned by the lack of an active Amateur Radio club in this part of Houston. The Houston Amateur Radio Club had virtually ceased to operate except for a station in the Science Museum. Other clubs had started in the Southwest (BVARC) and at NASA, but there was nothing within a reasonable distance of our part of town.

In those days BC, before computers, it was difficult to determine how many hams were in any given area and how to get in touch with them. The ARRL would furnish a set of mailing labels by ZIP code if they could be convinced it was for a good cause. Dee Logan (W1HEO) managed to convince Newington and the labels were obtained.

On May 23 1985 the first steering committee meeting was held at the QTH of Dee Logan, W1HEO, in Memorial Northwest. Attending in addition to Dee were Bob Jahn, WA4JBV, Ken Edinborgh, W5BKK, Ken Harlan, KA5AKG, Dan Wells, N5IDE, Henry Freedenberg, N5HF, Bob Welch, KE5IC, Paul Frantz, KF5SB, Mike Pfeiffer, K5WIM, Dick Rousseau, KA4MFS, Dick Combs, N5DRM, Kirby Van Horn, K7WOC and Jerry Smith, W5NKZ. At this meeting a decision was made to proceed with the formation of NARS. Information was to be sent out using the mailing labels provided by the ARRL and a general meeting was scheduled at the Heathkit store on FM1960. How many remember that there was a Heathkit store on 1960?

Even with the condition of the bands, I look for more participation as we move into autumn and the cooler weather.

Even fellow DX-er Bruce, N1LN did not burn up his hard-drive logging a lot of DX. Three SSB DX Q's on 20 meters; one of which was a new IOTA! But Bruce was busy with the state-side contest to keep the cob webs from his equipment.

That brings to mind. There has been a lot of IOTA activity this month with vacationing hams traveling afar and not-so-far So if you IOTA-chaser haven't been searching; you are missing some nice IOTA contacts. Get with it while the 'pickings are good'! The bulletins are full of planned island hopping by, especially the Europeans.

Jim, KJ5X is offering a reward for early reports of several rare–DX operations planned: 9N, S2 and the potential upcoming KH7 and FR/G operations. Get in early before the multitudes!
